Bob Hayes... a PGS legend gone too soon



BOB HAYES was a brilliant journalist, a witty and knowledgeable friend and a much better

golfer than he ever admitted.
His loss, at the terribly young age of 67, will be felt keenly by all who knew him.

I had the privilege of knowing Bob for more than 30 years, working closely with him at both the News of the World and The Sun. He was enormously kind to me when I first joined The Sun in 1994 and, indeed, throughout my career.

He was a man of many talents and accomplishments. He served on the backbench of The Sun's sportsdesk for many years, having joined the paper in 1986. He rose to become deputy sports editor and had an astonishing gift for headline-writing.

If anyone was ever struggling for a line, or in need of a witty pun, Bob would have the answer. His ability sometimes left you in utter amazement, knowing you could never be that good.

He loved football and was very proud of having been a ballboy at the 1966 World Cup Final. Born and bred in Shepherd's Bush, he was a lifelong QPR fan.

He was a gifted match reporter, priding himself on turning in just the right number of words so that his colleagues on the subs' desk didn't have too much to do.

He had a great affection for the lower reaches of the game, covering clubs like Wycombe, MK Dons and Northampton with distinction. He was a much-loved and respected member of those press boxes and had friends at all levels of the game.

He made his living out of words, but had an equal ability with numbers. Give him the hardest multiplication sum you could imag-ine and Bob would fire back the answer in seconds. I once asked him how he did it, but he couldn't tell me. It was a gift you couldn't teach and came with effortless ease.

Beyond work, he had an encyclopaedic knowledge of music and a great love especially of country music. There are many people who have grown to love artists they were first introduced to by Bob.

As in many areas of his life, Bob was selfdeprecating about his golf. He was a wonderful companion on the course, never getting down about the bad shots and always ready to smile about other people's good fortune. He had a fund of great stories and was no stranger to the winners' circle off a very

competitive handicap.

He joined the PGS in 1992 and played in eight Wryter Cups. He won the News of the World Cup in 2011, and the Division Two honours at the 1996 Captain's Day and the 2007 President's Day.

It says much for him that he had far more success when playing with a partner than on his own. With Phil Leach, he won the Sun Challenge Trophy in 1999 and the Wilkinson Sword in 2002; with Chris Wright, the Sir Leicester Harmsworth Trophy in 2000 and, with Glen Bevis, the Sir George Sutton

Salver in 2009. He won the Sir Harry Brittain Coronation Trophy twice, first with Geoff Wheeler in 1998 and, memorably, with Rick Evans in 2018, when they scored an incredible 50 stableford points in the greensomes around Ashridge.

He also founded the annual Bun and Bone tournament, played between Bob's team of journalists and his brother-in-law Tony Butcher's team of BT colleagues. That began in 1994, with four a side at Woburn, where Bob was a member for many years, and grew into a 10 a side challenge.

Bob truly was a team man. He didn't enjoy the limelight, preferring the camaraderie he found in playing a supporting role. That was epitomised by the way he chose to keep the cancer which claimed his life quiet from

everyone but close family.

It was for that family - wife Lynn, their three daughters and four grandchildren, one of whom, Megan, was born with cystic fibrosis that he played his greatest supporting role. He put them first in every decision he made.

Bob was planning a sponsored walk up Snowdon in June this year to raise funds for research into cystic fibrosis but Covid-19 put paid to that long before he became ill. His family now plan to complete that walk next year.

His family will miss him most, but Bob leaves a massive hole in the lives of everyone who was fortunate enough to call him a friend. There will never be another like him. Rest in peace, Bob. - Tim Allan


