

Desert Lomas storms Swinley

MARK LOMAS swept all aside with a scintillating net 61 in the first meeting of this delayed season at the sublime Swinley Forest. Lomas, just back from a posting to Dubai, demonstrated a gulf in class to claim the Lord Riddell Memorial Trophy by a clear

four shots.

For the first, and hopefully last, time this PGS fixture had to be spread across three days, ranging from the 4th to the 24th of May. As Rick Evans observed, Colin Hancock was probably the longest-standing clubhouse leader in history after his net 65 set the pace in fierce conditions in the opening instalment of this traditional medal.

The Mail's Chris Cutmore, Adam Hunt and Roderick Easdale came close with two-under par 67s, but it was dessert king Lomas who

went a remarkable six better in the final round to rise to the top and savour the sweet taste of victory. "It was one of those days where everything just came together", Lomas

reflected, toying with his treacle tart.
"Hitting greens in regulation and sinking putts. It's the best round I've played and probably the best round I'll ever play!"

Harry Colt's Swinley looked magnificent beneath the looming thunderstorms and mercifully the worst held off until all were safely in. The club negotiated Covid restrictions equally adeptly, first in a marquee and by day three back inside the dining room, although sadly without the traditional steak and kidney pudding on the menu. Perhaps something to

look forward to when we return next October.

Swinley also saw the first of this season's nearest the pin series, arranged by Captain Dylan Dronfield with Adnams in aid of Cancer Research, a charity close to Dylan's heart. Day one was won by PGS President Philippa Kennedy, day two by Jonathan Baker with the only shot to hold the tricky 17th green and day three by new member James Saville.

But the meeting belonged to Lomas, who's hoping his current form carries him through to face the French at Hoylake.

"It's been seven years since I last played at Swinley and it was every bit as good as I remembered it. It's been great slotting back into the PGS and hard as it may be to believe, I've spent six years in Dubai dreaming of an overcast October back in the Wryter Cup team, so fingers crossed!"

The Price is right at Effingham

THE MIRROR'S Kevin Price rolled back the years and rolled in the putts at Effingham to take the Mirror Trophy in conditions ranging from the challenging to the downright brutal.

The meeting at Swinley avoided the worst of the forecast weather: that at Effingham didn't. Thursday's players had slightly the better of the conditions in the singles, but Price was still the only one to play to handicap, returning an excellent 36 points in strong winds.

"I had a landmark birthday this year so it was another special moment to be back at the top of the PGS leaderboard alongside the young guns", said Price, beneath darkening skies.

"I suppose it was my 'Mickelson' moment. It's

Geoff Wheeler

GEOFF WHEELER, who has died after a long illness, aged 86, joined the PGS in 1983 when he was sports editor of (the now defunct) national news agency Exchange Telegraph (Extel).

An enthusiastic member from the beginning, Geoff won nine PGS trophies and played in four Wryter Cup matches. His successes included the Sir Emsley Carr Memorial Trophy in 1986 and the Sir Harry Brittain Coronation Trophy in 1998 in harness with the late Bob Hayes. He also won the Wilkinson Sword three times, and one year took it home on the train following the PGS dinner an act that would no doubt trigger a terrorist 'scramble' today.

His career in sports journalism, spanning more than six decades, began in his home town of Cheltenham where he was indentured by the Gloucestershire Echo in 1952.

His local paper stint was punctuated by two years of national service before he moved to London as a 22-year-old. One of his early achievements as a wire reporter was to marshal Extel's reaction to the fastbreaking Munich air disaster of



February 1958. It wasn't long before he became the agency's football and cricket correspondent, and in 1966 he attached himself to the World Cup group featuring Brazil and Portugal rather than follow Alf Ramsey's England.

Geoff's talents earned him promotion to sports editor in the mid-1970s. A decade later he was made managing editor before leaving in 1986 after 30 years of loval service.

A second career beckoned, largely due to the fellowship of the PGS of which, by then, Geoff was an integral part. He found a new home at News International and subbed on the sports desks of The Sun, News of the World and The Times for more than a quarter of a century. He crafted

his final 'Sunday for Monday' cricket round-up on The Times in 2013, at the age of 78.

Geoff clocked up more than 40 years as the Gloucestershire correspondent for Wisden. He played cricket for Tring Park for almost as long and was also a member of Redbourn Golf Club where his lowest handicap was 13. He is survived by Josie, his wife of 60-plus years, their son, daughter and three grand-daughters.

I would like to add a personal tribute to Geoff, one of the great friends of my life, but I can already hear him shouting across the divide: "Wrap it up, Trow. Keep it brief. No adjectives. Never be afraid of a full-stop."
