The former Beeb editor kept his cool as the mercury rose to heights never before seen at a PGS meeting. Matching the thermometer, point for degree celsius, Baker claimed the PGS memorial salver with a superb 38 points.

"I chose the hottest day in history to have my hottest round in years", said Maidenhead's Baker of his blistering performance. "The ultimate fair weather golfer."

Not that the fabulous Baker boy made toast of the field. Graham Marsden, Pip Clothier and Evan Samuel all finished just a point behind with 37, taking first, second and third respectively in Division Two.

Former PGS Secretary

Paolo Minoli claimed second in Division One with 34, followed in third by Nic Brook on 31.

A fine lunch sorted the wheat from the chaff and seven pairs headed back out into the bleached Ashridge heat to challenge for the Sir Harry Brittain Coronation Trophy.

The afternoon greensomes was reduced to

nine holes as a concession to the intense heat, although strangely the effects seemed most marked on those remaining behind at the bar.

As the sun, if not the temperature, began to dip, it was the in-form Graham Marsden and Jon Jones who returned from the parched Hertfordshire prairies with the title, edging out

Evan Samuel and Colin Hancock on countback.

Yet again Ashridge delivered a superb day on a wonderful golf course. The victorious, oven-ready, heat-specialist Baker, surveying the sunburnt fairways from the balcony, reflected: "I guess I'll now have to wait another couple of millennia before I manage it again." Given the current state of things, a successful defence in 2023 seems well within the realms of possibility.
