

Bubbles' Gallic fizz

Windfall for Bramley as he pips the prizes at The Berkshire

IT huffed and it puffed, but there was no blowing Bubbles down as Jonny Bramley tamed gale-force winds to triumph once again at the Berkshire – breezing away with both the Sun Challenge Trophy and more wine than even a thirsty Frenchman could dream of.

And it was indeed the French who provided Bramley with the inspiration for a sensational double, as he and partner Nev Appleton also won the Sir George Sutton Salver in the afternoon greensomes ahead of the PGS's annual battle against our Gallic rivals at Gullane.

Bramley explained: "I'm delighted

to be hitting a bit of form ahead of the Wryter Cup. In fact Nev and I gave ourselves extra motivation by imagining our afternoon opponents Jono Baker and Colin Hancock as a pair of feisty Frenchmen."

It might not be everyone's choice of fantasy, but if it leads to victory at the Berkshire and the Wryter Cup then we really can't argue.

The former BBC Sport big-wig was the only player in the morning singles to play to their handicap, carding a hugely impressive 36 points in conditions more often seen out the back of a jet engine than at this great venue, where we've become used to mellow mists and autumn sunshine.

The wind speed built over the morning and gusts topped 40mph, sending countless balls into the Red course's punishing heather and blowing scorecards away, quite literally in Steve Lewis' case after PGS captain John Quinn dropped it on the 6th hole.

Bramley, however, romped home ahead of Hugh Whittow and Baker, both on 35 points. Appleton (33) was the Division One winner ahead of Olly McCormack (31) and Paolo Minoli (30).

Conditions thankfully eased for the afternoon on the Blue course, leading to an unprecedented three-way tie at the top on 41 points. Bramley and Appleton edged out the unlucky Baker and Hancock, and Paul Kelso and Ian Woods, on countback. Sources suggested Baker was overheard muttering "Sacre bleu!" at the result.

But if sparks flew during the afternoon's play, that was nothing compared to the sparks generated by the undercarriage of Bramley's low-riding sportscar as it scraped the Swinley Road under the weight of all the prize plonk he somehow transported home. A lorry would have been more suitable than a Lotus.

Jones had been five up at one stage but then lost


several holes in a row to go into the back nine of the second round all square. But he held his nerve superbly in the final few holes to see off matchplay specialist Nev.

AFTER one or two recent hiccups, can I remind you all that you must notify me

as and when your handicap changes? That's in our rules, all of which can be found at pressgs.co.uk under the 'About Us' tab.

I know handicaps change much more frequently than they used to but please get in the habit of emailing me as and when yours does. I usually check everyone's handicap on the England Golf app before each meeting but it would be

easier to do it as I go along. While I'm on about rules, could you pay particular attention to those regarding the Emsley Carr matchplay knockout. After a few unfortunate incidents this year, we are going to enforce those rules to the letter next year.

That means anyone who concedes a match will be automatically disqualified from playing in both that year's Wryter Cup and the following year's Emsley Carr.

The relevant part of the rule reads: Dates set for Emsley Carr knockout rounds are immovable. Any Member who fails to fulfil his or her commitment to play a tie by the date fixed by the Secretary will concede the match, and be ineligible for consideration for the Wryter Cup team that season (even if they have qualified by other means) and will also be ineligible to compete in the following year's Emsley Carr knockout competition.

The course opened in 1909 and is mainly the work of Cuthburt Butchart, with input from Open champions Jack White and Willie Park Junior.

Recently the club have been renovating bunkers and taking out some trees to bring in more light and increase the movement of air.

Our day this Tuesday will be a one-round affair for the Peggy White Vase, claimed last year at Swinley by PGS Secretary Tim Allan, with breakfast and lunch included for a remarkable £100.
